"Realizing the Promise of Clean Cookstoves," a panel at the Council on Foreign Relations, presented by its Women and Foreign Policy Program, March 24.

The program noted that household air pollution from cookstove smoke is the fourth greatest health risk in the world: Three billion people still use solid fuels to cook and heat their homes. These fuels emit harmful smoke that claims more lives annually than malaria, leads to preventable diseases and injuries, and creates economic burdens for families, especially for women and girls. The panelists discussed how finding innovative solutions to replace solid fuel can not only save lives, but also promote economic growth and development.

The Adoption Gap: Exploring Social Dimensions of Design, Development and Diffusion of Household Energy Technologies, March 28

George Garland reported on this event held by the Yale Climate and Energy Institute.

The program summarized: "Over half of the world cooks its meals on unimproved cookstoves. Resulting emissions are responsible for an estimated 4 million deaths from respiratory ailments annually and are a significant contributor to global warming. Historic efforts to promote the use of cleaner and more efficient stoves have been largely unsuccessful. The workshop, "the Adoption Gap: Design, Development and Diffusion of Household Energy Technologies," brings together experts in marketing, communications and other realms necessary to solve this obstinate environmental and human health challenge."
